## Sir Douglas Bader

Honorary President: Sir Douglas Bader, K.B.E. . C.B.E.,  
D.S.O., D.F.C.

21 February 1910 – 5 September 1982

*Group Captain Bader was a Royal Air Force flying ace during the Second World War. He was credited with 22 aerial victories, four shared victories, six probables, one shared probable and 11 enemy aircraft damaged.*



This is the story of a man, Douglas Bader, who has become a legend in his own lifetime. He was discharged from the R.A.F. after losing both legs in an air crash in 1931, and who fought his way back to become one of the great heroes of the Battle of Britain. But the war was only an episode in a greater victory, his triumph over a disability which one would call crippling had he not deprived the world of its meaning. Douglas Bader was an outstanding athlete of his day. As a cadet at Cranwell he received his “blues” for cricket, rugby, hockey and boxing. He played for the R.A.F. at both cricket and rugby. He was expected to get his “cap” for England.

The qualities that made him a phenomenal athlete, also made him an exceptional pilot. At the age of twenty-one he was one, of the team of two, selected to perform the star aerobatics turn of the R.A.F. display at Hendon.

Then came tragedy.

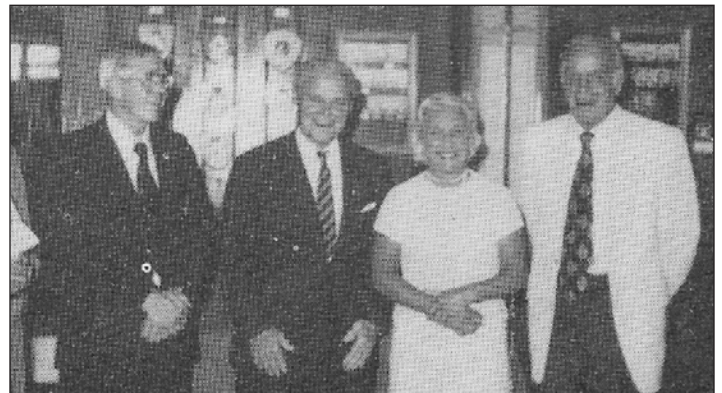
Always unable to resist a “dare,” he crashed his plane. He survived, but both legs had to be amputated. This would have been the end of any other man’s story. To Bader it was another “dare.” The doctors who fitted him with artificial legs gave him a stick and told him he’d never walk without one; no legless man ever had. Bader threw away the stick. He was determined to make no concessions to the loss of his legs. He swam, he danced, he played tennis, squash and golf. He flew again. He fell in love. Then the Air Ministry decided that a pilot without legs could not fly. He was discharged from the R.A.F. Bader found himself adrift in a world of mounting unemployment, in which men with both legs and qualifications were finding it a battle to survive. In such disheartening circumstances he got married - secretly. When the war broke out, the R.A.F. would only

offer him a ground job which he refused. By sheer persistence he fought his way back to flying. He was given command first of a flight, then a squadron, then three squadrons, then five. His exuberance, his utter disregard for danger was contagious. He was not only an inspiring leader of men; the fighter tactics he evolved and contributed to our victory in the Battle of Britain. When the R.A.F. went over to the offensive, Bader led one of the squadrons in the first sweep over France. When he was shot down it was ironically his lack of legs that saved his life.

“For you the war is over,” the Germans told him. But they didn’t know Douglas Bader. Within a matter of days he made his first escape down a rope of sheets from the third floor of a hospital. He became the “enfant terrible” of a succession of prison camps.

For his personal bravery and inspiring leadership during the war he has already been widely honoured. He holds that rare combination, the D.S.O. and bar, and D.F.C. and bar, as well as the Legion d’Honneur and the Croix de Guerre. But this story seeks to match the excitement and the inspiration of his war deeds with the story of his greater battle, the battle which he fought alone; it honours his more enduring achievement in the cause of humanity, the new horizons he has opened for the physically disabled by his personal example and by the triumph of his spirit over a cruel adversity. Above all, it reflects the strong sense of humor, another Bader characteristic, which makes his story the more memorable, and wins him not only the admiration but the affection of the reader.

## June 2021- Wing AGM

700 Wing had the Annual General Meeting on June 6 2021. Because of COVID, it was our first virtual meeting and we hope last virtual AGM.

The meeting was relatively short. Nick Nimchuk submitted the financial statements for the 2020 financial year. Brian Andrus submitted the casino report indicating that the Wing has received an extension on its spending in the casino account until September 2022. This allows the Wing to pay its fixed costs from the casino account until then. There is little flexibility on other spending.

We had a casino in June and it is hoped we will have some financial resources to assist us in our programming goals. We do not anticipate the same revenue as in past years and must adjust our budget accordingly.

We had our elections at this meeting and all the directors allowed their names to stand for the upcoming 2021-2022 year except, Nanette Booth. Since then, the Directors had a meeting and appointed Tom Booth as our new secretary. Welcome aboard Tom!

### Other News

With the new guidelines introduced by the Alberta Government on September 4<sup>th</sup>, we do not foresee in-person meetings in the near future. The Board will re-evaluate the situation on a monthly basis.

Several planned activities which the Wing had on its agenda now have been postponed. The Alberta Provincial Committee, Alberta Provincial Committee Golf Tournament has now been scheduled for May 14, 2022. The 408 Squadron Gala and golf tournament is rescheduled for Spring of 2022. So too our Battle of Britain Commemorative Dinner, next year.

Despite these sad events, the Wing lives in hope. And in hope, a near miracle occurred this summer for the Alberta International Airshow. Somehow the sponsorships came together at the 11<sup>th</sup> hour and the show happened August 21 and 22 featuring the USAF A-10 Warthog and the CF-18 Demo Hornet. 700 Wing manned a booth selling merchandise. Demand was so heavy we ran out of some things the first day! Early numbers show 27,000 came on Saturday and over 8,000 came in the rain on Sunday. Thank you to Nick Nimchuk, Joe Twyman, and Bernie Sheppard for helping me man the 700 Wing booth. A big Bravo Zulu goes out to 700 Wing Vice-Chair Tom Sand and Communications Director Brian Andrus for working with show producer Richard Skermer of RWE Events to pull this event together.

# Royal Canadian Air Cadet of Canada Museum Update

The display at the Alberta Aviation Museum in Edmonton has been set up in the event hall in the walkway between the museum and the event hall. Over the next few months, the display will be designed and implemented. While the space provided is smaller than before the new location will make it visible to those who may not necessarily go to aviation museums. It is hoped that the Edmonton area Squadrons will help tell their stories and the display will increase awareness of the program and aid in recruiting staff and cadets.

The Air Cadet Museum team is in the process of setting up an Air Cadet Museum display at the bomber Command Museum of Canada in Nanton, Alberta. The Bomber Command Museum is excited to have an Air Cadet display. The vision of the display is to tell the stories of those who joined cadets and eventually went on to join Bomber Command. It is also envisaged that the stories of the Squadrons in southern Alberta will also be part of the display. The display will be in the British Commonwealth Air Training plan section of the Bomber Command Museum of Canada. The display is expected to officially open in early 2022.

The design work for the Air Cadet display at the new Royal Aviation Museum of Western Canada in Winnipeg continues. The centrepiece of the display will be a glider suspended from the ceiling. The museum is scheduled to open early in 2022.

The museum continues to receive donations from across Canada. If you know of anyone who has some Air Cadet related artifacts looking for a good home, point them our way.

Finally, the Royal Canadian Air Cadet Museum has had some new signage made in the shape of the logo. See image below. They will feature prominently in the display at the AAM and the Bomber Command Museum of Canada.

## 700 Wing at the 2021 Alberta International Airshow

After two years without an airshow in the Edmonton area, organizers, under a very tight timeline, successfully staged the Alberta International Airshow at Ville-neuve airport on August 21-22. Members Brian Andrus and Tom Sand played key roles in the planning and operation of the show highlighting the Wing's significant contribution to the aviation scene in the province.

The first day of the airshow was spectacular with excellent weather and an extremely impressive turnout of over 30,000. Notable acts were the RCAF CF-18 demonstration team, the US EA-18A Growlers and the A10 Warthog ground attack aircraft. The show also highlighted the first appearance in Canada of the British Army Red Devils Parachute Team.

The 700 Wing also participated in the show with a vendor tent providing an excellent venue to raise awareness of the RCAFA and its mission. In addition the Wing was highly successful in raising funds through the sale of RCAF related merchandise and memorabilia. Sales and attendance at our booth were so brisk that our entire inventory of over 30 tee shirts sold out before the end of the first day of the show.

The inclement weather on day two of the show prevented most of the aerial acts from flying however

8,000 turned through the gates to take in the static displays and food trucks. The departure of the CF-18s provided some last minute jet noise while the wing wagging farewell of the A-10s showcased their finely tuned low level flying capabilities.

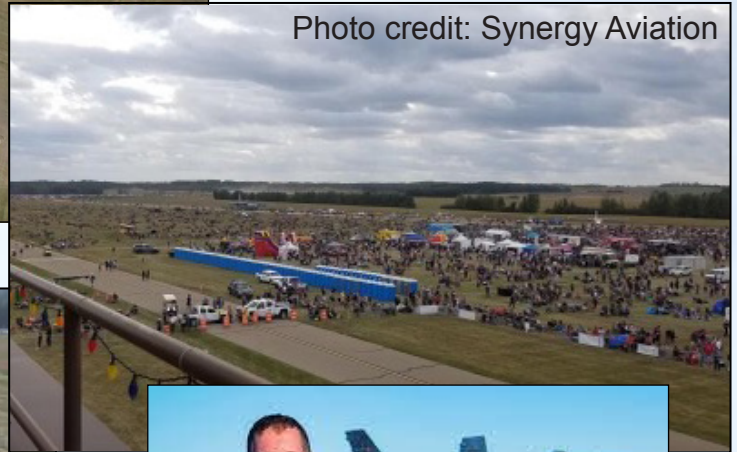

## Air Gunner John Kozoriz

01-Jun-1925 - 07-Dec-2020

John was born in Red Deer, AB on June 1st, 1925 and was raised along the rail lines of central Alberta. In 1944, he enlisted in the RCAF with 441 Squadron and was positioned as a Tail Gunner. He served in Canada and was deployed to England during WWII. Post war he was stationed throughout Canada, including stops in Winnipeg MB, Aylmer, ON, Calgary, AB, Toronto, ON, Ottawa, ON as well Marville, France. He arrived back in Canada in June 1961 and had been calling Edmonton AB home ever since. John retired from service in 1973 at the Rank of (flight) Sergeant.

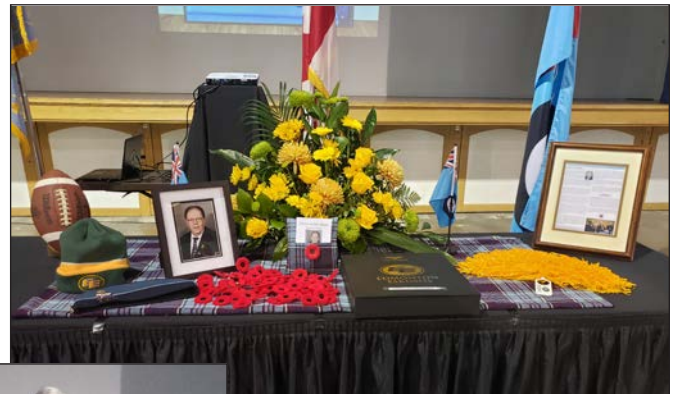
